

Knowledge: Where does the story take place?	Knowledge: How does the story end?
Knowledge: What is the problem in the story?	Comprehension: How was the problem in the story solved?
Comprehension: How did the main character feel at the beginning of the story? How did the character feel at the end?	<u>Comprehension:</u> Explain why the story has the title it does.
Application: What would you do if you could go to where the story takes place?	Application: What would your mother do if she was in the story?
Application: If you had to cook a meal for the main character, what would you cook? Why?	Analysis: What part of the story was funniest? The saddest? The most exciting? Why?
Analysis: What things in the story could have REALLY happened?	<u>Analysis:</u> What do you do that is just like what the person in the story did?
Synthesis: How else could the story have ended? Why do you think that?	Synthesis: Retell the story from another character's (such as an animal's) point of view.
Synthesis: Think of 2–3 new titles that give a good idea of what the story was about.	<u>Evaluation:</u> Compare/contrast two of the characters.
<u>Evaluation:</u> Was the main character in the story good or bad? Please explain.	Evaluation: Would you recommend this story to a friend? Why or why not?

Knowledge: Share something you already know about the topic.	Knowledge: Define a word from the text.
Knowledge: Label a picture, map, or diagram from the text.	Comprehension: Explain why the text has the title it does.
Comprehension: What is the text mainly about?	Comprehension: What are the most important ideas to remember from this text?
Application: Why is the topic significant?	Application: What questions would you ask the author about this topic?
Application: Share what you've learned and how you will use this information in your life.	Analysis: How was this text similar to others you have read?
Analysis: What conclusions can you draw after reading this text? What in the text makes you think that?	Analysis: What would be another good title for this text? Why?
Synthesis: What information would you add to the text?	Synthesis: Design a new book cover for this text. What would it look like? Why?
<u>Synthesis:</u> Create a poem about this topic.	<u>Evaluation:</u> What changes would you recommend for this text? Why?
Evaluation: Would you recommend this text to a friend? Why or why not?	<u>Evaluation:</u> Do you agree with the author? Explain why or why not.

- ✓ Print the question sheets on white cardstock.
- ✓ Laminate the sheets.
- ✓ Cut each set of questions apart.
- ✓ Hole punch the left side of the questions.
- ✓ Use a brad to assemble each set.



- Segin with knowledge level questions and move to higher order questions.
- ① Don't answer all the questions! Just a few will do.
- © These questions will help prompt your questioning and you will easily come up with appropriate level questions that link specifically with the text you are using.
- © Remember, one set is for *fiction* and the other for *nonfiction*.
